Money Shouldn't Stop You

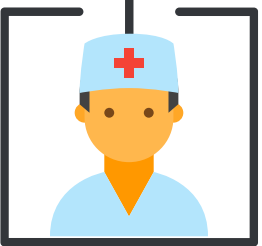

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Consider Your Independence

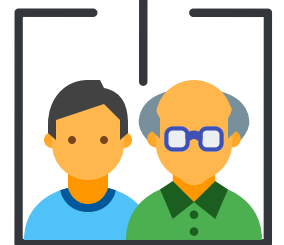


If you don't have an incapacity plan, your independence is essentially taken away from you. When you do have a plan in place, your decisions are made well ahead of time, and they are still your own.
